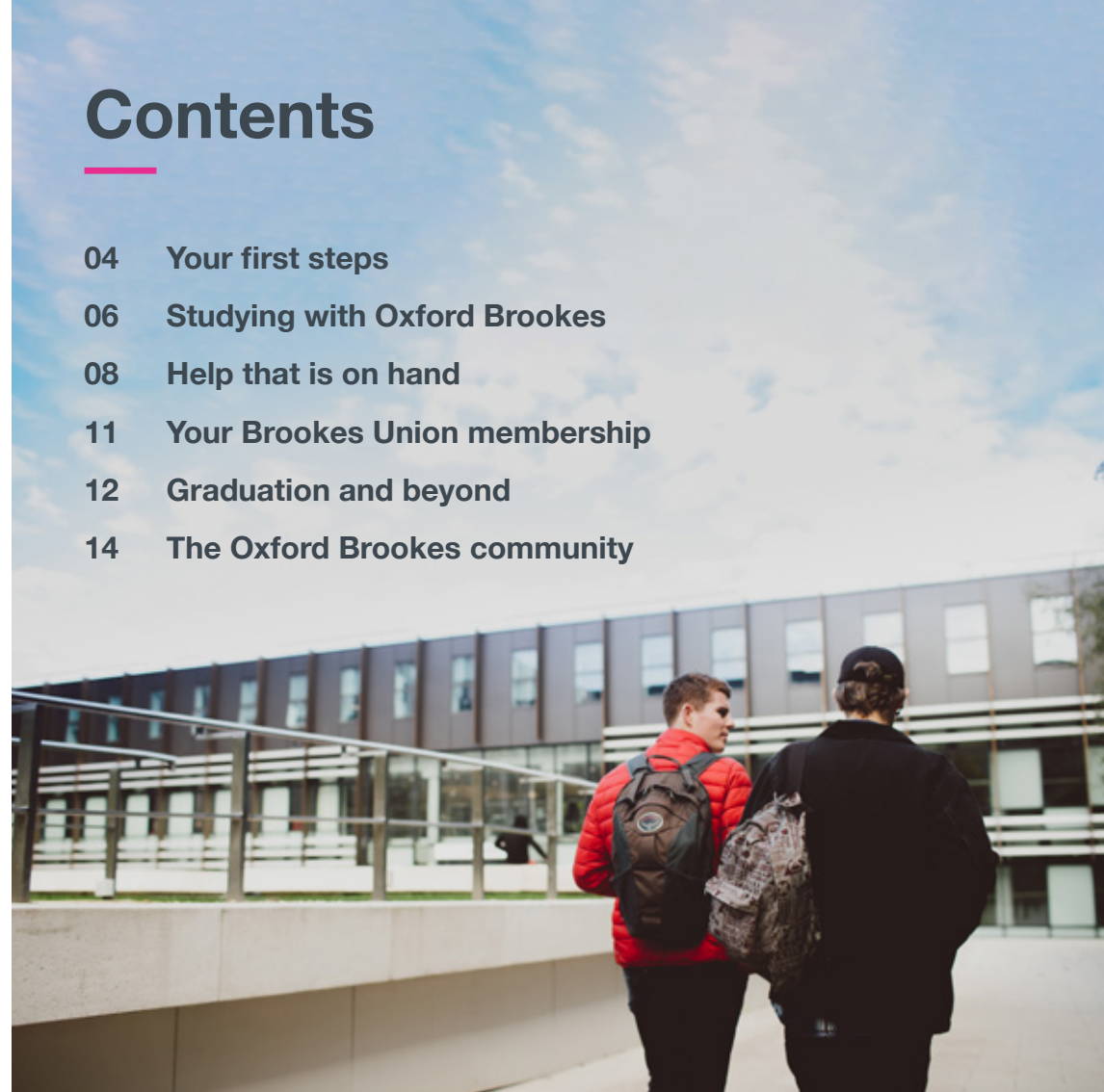

Your first steps

To help ensure your time as an Oxford Brookes student runs smoothly from the outset, we ask you to take some time to familiarise yourself with the following:

YOUR OXFORD BROOKES EMAIL ACCOUNT

You will have received an email account from Brookes to enable you to access University emails. Important information will be sent to you from the University via this channel. The system is powered by Google and can be accessed via a computer, tablet or smartphone. Please note that you will only be able to access your email account once you have completed your online enrolment with Oxford Brookes.

YOUR STUDENT INFORMATION

Equally important are the Self-Service pages containing information about you and your course. You can access this from the Student home page on the Oxford Brookes website. Amongst other things it plays a part in the following:

- enrolment
- module registration
- storing contact details – please ensure you have added an alternative email

At times during your course you may be required to update details held in Self-Service.

STUDENT ID CARD

You will receive your Oxford Brookes University ID card from your college/university centre once you have completed enrolment with both the university and your college/university centre. Remember to keep hold of your student ID card as it includes your student number, and without it you may not be able to access some of our resources, especially if you visit us on campus.

Studying with Oxford Brookes

As well as all the resources that exist at your college, you are also entitled to access many of those provided by Oxford Brookes - both online and in person.

LIBRARY RESOURCES

Your College library will be able to provide all your core readings. We also have an e-first policy for library resources at Oxford Brookes which we are constantly expanding. This provides you with broad content availability, whatever the topic. Each course is linked to one of our Academic Liaison Librarians, who can help you access resources.

When you are on campus at Oxford Brookes, our libraries provide:

- computers and wi-fi
- chromebooks for loan
- work spaces for quiet, private study and group work.

STUDY SKILLS

Whether you are returning to study after a break, or continuing straight on from secondary education, studying at a higher level can seem daunting. However, there is plenty of support and study skill advice on hand to help you make the step up, so don't be afraid to ask for help.

At Oxford Brookes, the Centre for Academic Development has a wide range of online study advice guides on topics ranging from note-taking, to critical writing and referencing.

Your college support staff and tutors can also give you a great deal of support if you are feeling unsure. You can also ask your fellow students who can often help too.

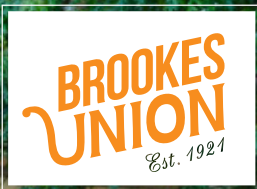

Brookes Union is here for students

Every student that studies at Oxford Brookes University automatically becomes a member of Brookes Union.

Representation

We represent students' interests and campaign on the priorities that matter to students at Brookes. Our elected representatives and officers represent you. There are 4 full-time officers and around 15 part-time officers who campaign on issues students tell us they care about. This year, our officers are committed to campaigning on the impact of Cost of Living on students, Sexual Health and Guidance (SHAG) and building community and the sense of belonging across campuses.

Community

We support societies and run events; helping students to build strong communities. There are over 85 societies with everything from Musical Theatre (OBMT) to Psychology, Christian Union to Nursing and Indian Brookes to Swiftie. These societies are led by

students and provide spaces for like minded students to come together, have fun and develop new skills. There is something for everyone, and if you can't find the society you like, you can start your own.

Advocacy

We support students and equip them with the confidence, resources and skills to advocate for themselves. Our Advice service offers advice on university processes such as Exceptional Circumstances, Appeals, Complaints and Misconduct. We also support you if you experience issues in Brookes halls of residence. We work with other services to support you during your time at Brookes, if we can't help we can recommend a service that can.

Graduation and beyond

While the end of your course may seem a long way off, time will fly. To mark the culmination of your academic achievement you are entitled to attend our graduation ceremony as an Oxford Brookes student.

Upon graduation you become a member of the Oxford Brookes alumni community. So, wherever you are, and whatever you're doing with your life, you're still part of Oxford Brookes and can enjoy alumni benefits.

When you are ready to think about what follows, there is guidance available on shaping your future.

As well as those provided at college, you can call on the online services that Careers at

Oxford Brookes offers and which remain open to you for up to three years after you graduate.

The first few weeks at college can be hectic - this short checklist might help.
